LAUDATO SI' GOAL ONE: Responding to the Cry of the Earth

New Action: SOLARIZATION - Encourage and assist the remaining 35% of parishes of the diocese without solar to pursue this action, greatly reducing our diocesan carbon footprint. (Creation Care Action Plan¹ Chapter 4, 'Purchasing and Producing Clean Energy,' p. 30)

Continued Action:

ELIMINATE PLASTIC WATER BOTTLES - Expand on last year's efforts to reduce plastic water bottle use at the diocesan Pastoral Center. Phase out use in the chancery completely and continue to encourage significant reduction of single-use plastics throughout our parishes and schools (CCAP Chapter 4, 'Ban bottled water,' p. 34)

TREE PLANTING PROGRAM – Continue/increase our tree planting program with special focus on increasing the urban tree canopy in the following communities: Barrio Logan, Logan Heights, Sherman Heights, Grant Hill, Stockton, San Ysidro, Mt. Hope, Mountain View, Southcrest, and Shelltown. (CCAP Chapter 4, 'Increase Tree Canopy,' p. 37)

LAUDATO SI' GOAL TWO: Responding to the Cry of the Poor

New Action: CREATION CARE AT FATHER JOE'S VILLAGE – Develop and conduct participatory creation care activity in collaboration with Father Joe's Village efforts to prevent and end homelessness, expanding local action to our poorest and most vulnerable with compassion, respect, empathy, empowerment and dignity for all. (CCAP Chapter 1, 'The Need for Dialogue and Participation,' p. 10)

DIOCESAN MAP OF ENVIRONMENTAL VULNERABILITY - Produce a map depicting zones of insecurity - (CCAP Chapter 2, 'Catholic Teaching to Respond to the Cry of the Poor and the Cry of the Earth,' p. 17)

REUSABLE FOOD DISTRIBUTION BAGS - Continue to provide sustainable bags to Miseriacordia food distribution efforts and conduct drives for reusable bags throughout the year. (CCAP Chapter 3, 'Buying and Sharing Food and Reducing Waste,' p. 25-26)

LAUDATO SI' GOAL THREE: Developing Ecological Economics

New Action: RESISTING THROWAWAY CULTURE CAMPAIGN – Initiate "A Cup a Day" Campaign to track usage in the staff breakroom and to promote bringing one's own reusable wares/utensils to work, revealing the economic and ecological benefit of rejecting a "throwaway culture." (CCAP Chapter 7, 'Live Simply,' p. 43)

"When they had had their fill, he said to his disciples, 'Gather the fragments left over, so that nothing will be wasted.""

These problems are closely linked to a throwaway culture which affects the excluded just as it quickly reduces things to rubbish. To cite one example, most of the paper we produce is thrown away and not recycled. It is hard for us to accept that the way natural ecosystems work is exemplary: plants synthesize nutrients which feed herbivores; these in turn become food for carnivores, which produce significant quantities of organic waste which give rise to new generations of plants. But our industrial system, at the end of its cycle of production and consumption, has not developed the capacity to absorb and reuse waste and by-products.

New Action: IMPACT INVESTMENT WORKSHOP - Hold a workshop discussing socially responsible business practices and introducing the concept of "Impact Investing?" (CCAP Chapter 4, 'Divest/reinvest,' p. 31)

"It will be as when a man who was going on a journey called in his servants and entrusted his possessions to them. To one he gave five talents; to another, two; to a third, one—to each according to his ability. Then he went away. Immediately the one who received five talents went and traded with them, and made another five. Likewise, the one who received two made another two. But the man who received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and buried his master's money. After a long time the master of those servants came back and settled accounts with them. The one who had received five talents came forward bringing the additional five. He said, 'Master, you gave me five talents. See, I have made five more.' LAUDATO SI' GOAL FOUR: Adopting Sustainable Lifestyles

New Action: EXPAND RECYCLING AND COMPOSTING - Place color-coded trash bins in all meeting spaces with tailor-made signage directing what goes where to ensure proper disposal. (CCAP Chapter 7, 'Encourage Recycling,' p. 42)

New Action: SUSTAINABILITY VIDEO - Make a video of the practices put into use at the Pastoral Center and exemplary parishes/schools and share it with parishes. (CCAP Chapter 7, 'Implement Ecological Purchasing,' p. 41)

LAUDATO SI' GOAL FIVE: Promoting Ecological Education

New Action: CREATION CARE DIOCESAN TRAINING DAY – Offer training to the diocesan Pastoral Center team to facilitate incorporation of Care for Creation into their ministry areas and operations. (CCAP Introduction, 'The Goals of this Creation Care Action Plan,' p. 9)

"We see increasing sensitivity to the environment and the need to protect nature, along with a growing concern, both genuine and distressing, for what is happening to our planet. New Action: CREATION CARE TEENS PROGRAM & YOUTH GATHERING – Implement the Catholic Climate Covenant Youth Wholemakers Program to animate a cadre of high school students. These students will develop their knowledge over the course of the year and will put their new skills to use, planning and executing a diocesan-wide Youth Retreat event (CCAP Chapter 8 'Our Responsibility to Youth and the Future,' p.44)

LAUDATO SI' GOAL SIX: Promoting Ecological Spirituality

New Action: PLANTING HOPE – Provide trees and planting expertise to facilitate a diocesan outreach program for victims of clergy abuse. (CCAP Chapter 5, 'Increase Tree Canopy,' p. 37)

LAUDATO SI' GOAL SEVEN: Community Resilience & Empowerment

New Action: LAUDATO SI GRANT PROGRAM – Facilitate local action in parishes, schools, and/or Catholic-affiliated non-profits during Laudato Si' Week with \$5,000 in project funding (CCAP Introduction, 'The Goals of this Creation Care Action Plan,' p. 9)

New Action: IMPERIAL VALLEY/SALTON SEA PILGRIMAGE – plan October 2025 event to highlight the environmental catastrophe of the Salton Sea, the opportunity to extract lithium in support of renewable energy technology at this site, and the significant poverty and injustice that has historically characterized the Imperial Valley region. (CCAP Chapter 3, 'Caring for the Vulnerable, for the Excluded, and for Our Common Home,' p. 22)
